

Andrea Kremer
Multiple Emmy Award Winning Broadcaster

Andrea Kremer is a two-time Emmy Award winning sports correspondent. Her knowledge, intensity, and versatility have earned her respect and accolades in the media industry for over two decades. *TV Guide* said Kremer is “among TV's best sports correspondents of either sex,” and her work is “distinguished by her eagerness to calmly ask tough questions and her refusal to pursue the same old story.”

In May 2007, Kremer joined HBO's Emmy-Award winning show, *Real Sports with Bryant Gumbel* and in this role has displayed her passion for shedding light on the interplay between sports and society. She has reported on sensitive issues such as sexual assault, domestic violence, drug abuse, and performance enhancing substances, and conducted memorable interviews with individuals like Pete Carroll, DeMaurice Smith and Bill Parcells. In March 2011, she was the correspondent for the college football special report on *Real Sports* that made national headlines for its in-depth reporting into the business of the sport.

Additionally, Kremer served as a sideline and feature reporter for five seasons with NBC's Emmy Award-winning *Sunday Night Football* and contributed to the network's studio show, *Football Night in America*. In her role with NBC, she also worked as sideline reporter at Super Bowl XLIII. She has been recognized as “the best TV interviewer in the business of covering the NFL” by the *Los Angeles Times*.

Kremer reported numerous athlete and event storylines for NBC's Olympic coverage of the 2010 Vancouver Games and the 2008 Beijing Games, the most watched sporting event in U.S. television history. While in Beijing, she covered swimming and diving and chronicled swimmer Michael Phelps' epic pursuit of eight gold medals.

In addition to the Olympics and Super Bowl, she has also covered many of America's most high-profile sporting events, including the NBA Finals, Stanley Cup Finals, MLB League Championship Series, NCAA men's basketball tournaments, and the PGA Championship. She has also conducted extensive interviews with legendary sports figures such as Michael Jordan, Phil Jackson, Tom Brady, Jerry Rice, Ray Lewis and John Daly, along with many others.

Over the years, Kremer has received numerous awards and accolades for her work. In addition to winning Emmy Awards in 2001 and 2005, she received a PRISM Award in 2005 for her television news magazine segment on former NFL defensive standout Dexter Manley's battle with substance abuse and addiction. Kremer was also cited as Best Female Sportscaster in *P.O.V. Magazine* in a September 1997 poll and in 2001, *Working Mother Magazine* named her one of the Most Influential moms in the country.

Prior to working for NBC and HBO, Kremer spent 17 years at ESPN. As the network's first female correspondent, she provided in-depth reports for the network's top shows including *SportsCenter*, *Sunday NFL Countdown*, *Monday Night Countdown*, and *Outside the Lines*, while contributing regularly to ESPN Radio, ESPN.com and ESPNEWS.

Before ESPN, Kremer was the first female producer at NFL Films where she wrote, edited and directed numerous shows and documentaries. She was also the on air co-host of the nationally syndicated show *This is the NFL*.

A Philadelphia native, Kremer started her career as the sports editor of the *Main Line Chronicle*, Pennsylvania's largest weekly newspaper. She is a cum laude graduate of the University of Pennsylvania, and resides in Massachusetts with her husband, John Steinberg, and their son.
