

**Debbie Matenopoulos**  
Television Host

Throughout her career, Debbie Matenopoulos has consistently proven herself to be a versatile talent in the entertainment industry. For ten years, this two-time Emmy Award nominee has successfully sustained her career as a compelling journalist, talk show host, and burgeoning actress. By equally spanning her talents across numerous facets of entertainment, the public has naturally embraced Matenopoulos as a familiar and trusted face in both television and film.

Matenopoulos keeps viewers abreast of the latest in celebrity news and pop culture trends on E! Network's #2-rated show, the Daily 10. Matenopoulos also contributes her quick-wit and keen journalistic skill to some of E! Network's other popular programs. She hosts the network's live red carpet shows, which consistently garners E! its highest ratings of the year, including the Emmys, Grammys, Golden Globes, and Academy Awards. Four times a year, Matenopoulos also hosts the top-rated show Fashion Police. When not contributing to E!, Matenopoulos also co-hosts the Style Network's #1-rated show, Instant Beauty Pageant.

Her present hosting posts on E! and the Style Network are not Matenopoulos' first forays into entertainment journalism. In 1997, Matenopoulos made a name for herself by offering her point-of-view on the inaugural season of Barbara Walters' talk show, The View. While a co-host on the program, Matenopoulos was instrumental in building the format and reputation of the show. Offering the younger generation's perspective, Matenopoulos helped make the program a tremendous success. Her popularity among the younger demographic led to a guest appearance as herself on NBC's Saturday Night Live in a parody about the talk show. In July 2006, seven years after her last appearance, Matenopoulos was invited back to The View's table as a special guest co-host.

In 2000, after her stint on The View, Matenopoulos made her first venture into acting in the film Endsville; opposite Judd Nelson, William Fichtner and Alan Ruck. Also that year, Matenopoulos lent her voice to MTV's popular claymation series Celebrity Deathmatch as herself. She later went on to be the mistress of ceremonies for the Celebrity Deathmatch video game, which in 2003 was the #1 selling game for PlayStation II. She has also frequently contributed to VH1 specials, including I Love the 90s and I Love Toys; as well as entertainment reports on the TV Guide Channel.

Matenopoulos, who received her journalistic degree from NYU, never strayed far from her journalistic roots. In August 2004, Matenopoulos co-hosted the nationally syndicated morning show, Good Day Live. With Arthel Neville, Matenopoulos delivered the news each weekday with a blend of fun, entertainment and fashion segments.

Following the cancellation of Good Day Live, Matenopoulos quickly became part of the E! Network family. Her success and public appeal over the years is what has led Matenopoulos to her many posts as host on the network.
